Memories of Living on the Caracciolo Farm in Stow

he family farmhouse that created memories for Francisco and Daisy Caracciolo's 13 children also held a hidden piece of Stow History! Inside the farmhouse was the original Walker cabin, built by William Walker in 1802. William Walker came from Virginia and was Stow's first settler. Walker is credited for establishing Stow Rd. He didn't observe property lines and walked

across privately owned land. Many other settlers decided to follow him and made a path that was later known as Stow Road.

Francisco J. Caracciolo and Daisy M. Easterday were married on June 9th, 1928.





The Farmhouse







The Caracciolo family moved onto the farm from Cuyahoga Falls in 1937 with six children. As the original cabin had changed so did the family to include seven more children.


Francisco Caracciolo worked at the Akron Beacon Journal and the Cleveland Times Press as a pressman. Frank was a WWI veteran honored with a Silver Star. He also worked the farm along with his wife Daisy Caracciolo and their children. Daisy worked raising and teaching the children, cooking the meals, tending the large garden and canning vegetables. Various other farm chores included steering the cultivator the horses would pull, taking care of the animals, and butchering chickens for dinner. Daisy worked in the pump house washing clothes and hanging them to dry, outside when possible and inside in the winter.

1: Rosalia's family recalls she disliked the farm-life, leaving behind conveniences like running water for a cistern and a pump. Then trading indoor plumbing to life with an outhouse was difficult. Another memory from Rosalia's family is she climbed a tree and broke her arm but didn't tell anyone for fear she would be in trouble.





2: Francisca's family memories were of growing up caring for the chickens in the coop, gathering eggs, and milking Chocolate Drop the cow. The children started learning to milk about the age of seven. There was the chore of feeding Blacky the family bull. The necessary walks to the outhouse day and night, even in the winter.

3: Joanne remembers moving into the farmhouse at 5 years old. The holes were still in the wall for the pot-bellied stove, and the basement floor was dirt. The horsehair plaster was still visible underneath the drywall from the original cabin. She recalls helping her mom with the little ones through the years.

4: Joseph remembers using a team of horses to pull the cultivator. Mom would follow behind steering it. He worked plowing fields and planting corn. Later, the horses were replaced by a

Case tractor. He recalls hunting for pheasant and rabbit. They slaughtered hogs and did chores. A game they played was kick the can.

5: Anthony's family remembers that he had a goat for milk because he couldn't drink cow's milk. There was an outhouse that had Sears and Roebuck catalog in it for use. The kids would run through the fields barefoot, and there was nothing like the surprise of stepping in a fresh cowpie and feeling it ooze between your toes. Joe and Tony worked the Case tractor together. It was mentioned that they had some brotherly squabbles growing up.



6: Rita remembers the family's very big garden along Stow Road. "We all had to work in it and help Mom can the food. We made a dry sauce with the tomatoes for spaghetti." Rita has memories of the boy that came to deliver loads of coal for the furnace. She and Kathryn would look out the window and say, "He's mine, I saw him first." "No, he's mine," and so this went on.... but in the end Rita got Gene! They were married!

7: Kathryn's family memories incude sharing a bed with her three sisters Rita, Helen and Therese, nice and cozy in a wrought iron bed. The girls were in one room, the boys were in the other one. Trips to the outhouse was another memory. Kathryn would take Bernadette for rides on Tar Baby the horse. One time they both fell off by the farmhouse!

8: Helen remembers riding Tar Baby the horse bareback to the back 40 and playing in the hayloft with her sisters pretending to make a bed up there. "When Dad couldn't find us, we got in trouble!! It was still fun! We had a huge garden and picked fresh vegetables for every meal. There was always work to be done from the chicken coop to helping Mom in the house. When Ron and I got out of the Air Force we lived at the farm for a while with our babies, it was nice being there with family around."





10: Francisco remembers our Christmas surprise was seeing the tree set up and decorated on Christmas morning. "Dad did that! Then we had to wait for everyone in the family to show up before we could open gifts." He mentioned that when he milked Chocolate Drop he would sing songs to her and occasionally squirt his siblings with milk! He also enjoyed the taste of his Dad's blackberry wine that was made in the pumphouse. The kids would sneak in to taste it.

11: George recalls the dinners that Mom prepared. "Dad got a lot of plants for us to put in the garden, we had to hoe, plant, plow, weed, drive the horses. We also rode the horses. We had goose, duck, and chicken eggs. We got up and milked the cow before going to school." George also remembers enjoying digging in the snow!

12: Bernadette has memories of going out with Dad and her siblings every May into the woods to pick large-stemmed violets by the handfuls for their Mom for Mother's Day! "In summertime we went out with our arms and legs completely covered to pick blackberries with Dad. We had to bring them all back to the house without eating them so Mom could make them into cobblers. Sometimes we had some leftover with milk!"

13: David enjoyed the openness and freedom of living the farm life. He went hunting, and remembers having fox chase him! There was gigging for fish in the creek across the road, playing on hay bales in the barn! Then there were games with siblings and contests with the boys from the City!
